<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>The <b>earliest two academic papers</b> to report on the phenomenon of technostress (stress from the use of IT) in the IS literature.</li> <li>Started a <b>new stream of research in IS</b> and spawned significant further research—evidenced by citations in IS journals.</li> <li>For <b>other disciplines</b> (e.g. organizational psychology and medicine), they theoretically re-conceptualized the phenomenon of stress to include concepts from IS use and management. <b>Scholars from these disciplines have cited these IS papers</b> to understand how stress is being shaped by IT.</li> <li>Highlighted the potentially negative impacts of IT use, spawning a two-volume special issue at Information Systems Journal (Dark Side of IT Use – 25/3 and 25/4), and new mini-tracks/tracks focused on this theme at AMCIS/ECIS.</li> <li>Publications in practitioner literature and media coverage attest to their organizational/societal relevance.</li> </ul>
